## Service Stripes, 1872-1916

The army started to adopt a variety of cloth marks on the sleeves of enlisted men who had served various enlistment periods at the end of the Revolutionary War. Various schemes came and went. Obtaining original service chevrons before 1872 is a challenge and are not described in this discussion.

Some of those service stripes prescribed in 1872 and later are still available to collectors. The color schemes used during these 44 years frequently changed, which causes confusion today. The meaning of many stripes with dozens of color schemes often is not apparent. Worn on the lower sleeve and sewn to the coat at an approximate 30 degrees angle, these service stripes told people the history of the soldier.

One color service stripes (table below) were worn to show each completed enlistment.

Two-color service stripes,  $\frac{1}{2}$  inch wide (next table) were for service in Indian campaigns and the Spanish American War, except for the first listed stripe, which was just for an enlistment in the Hospital Corps.

center stripe) were for war service in other branches and were used between 1896 and 1902 when Hospital Corps soldiers did not have dress uniforms.

Three color service stripes were used briefly by Corps of Engineer soldiers as shown in the following table. In all cases <u>the center white was chain stitched</u>.

In 1884 the army introduced gold lace chevrons for dress uniforms. Similarly, gold lace service stripes were sewn to various colors of wool backgrounds. The following table lists the prescribed dates for these service stripes.



Generally, 1902 Regulations called for service stripes representing peacetime service to be branch colored and 10 inches long. A significant 1902 change was the introduction of dark blue wool backgrounds to service stripes. Two examples are shown at the right. The top one has a red stripe showing artillery peacetime service, with a background that makes the entire stripe 3/4 inch wide. The lower stripe has medical colors (maroon with white trim), plus the dark blue background. Stripes that are branch colored and are on a dark blue wool show peacetime service.

Regulations of 1902 called for a white strip down the service stripe center to show wartime service. Campaign medals came into soldiers' lives in 1905 with the creation of a range of new awards. As a result the War Department decided that soldiers wartime service would be shown by campaign ribbons only and such soldiers were directed not to wear the "service in war" service stripes. Soldiers who were in the army during a war but did not qualify for a medal could wear service in war chevrons with white center.





Examples for artillery and medical soldiers are shown above. The navy blue background is gone but importantly, they have branch colors with a wide white center.

Starting in the 1890s an increasing number of soldiers made the army their home as treatment of men improved, coupled with the consolidation of units to centralized posts and campaigns against Native Americans declined. Old Soldiers sleeves became encumbered with service stripes. In response, during mid 1910 the army decided to make service stripes only 3/8 inch wide and also to eliminate the stripes' background cloth. Due to stocks on hand of the wider and thicker 1902 pattern, few of these narrower 1910 insignia were made. At this same time wear of the blue uniform reduced significantly. In 1916 the army suspended issue of blue uniforms. With this, issue of the 1902 and 1910 styles stripes ended.
